Why did you decide to support the campaign for a new EMS building? In the past fifty-plus years I have seen hospital services and the number of health care professionals expand to better serve the entire valley. The Gunnison Valley Health Foundation also emerged and became the support and fundraising entity for many services under its umbrella. It allows donors to support areas that may have been very helpful or meaningful personally and are important to the Gunnison Valley. For me that has included Hospice and Palliative Care and more recently, the fundraising for the new EMS station. No one wants to anticipate the need to call 911 for emergency medical services but when it is necessary, professional and reliable help ready to respond as quickly as possible can be lifesaving. The new EMS facility will allow professionals to be on site, ready, and available to travel for immediate care and give them a central place for equipment, storage of supplies, rest, and fitness activities.

The Need

Once a mostly volunteer team of college students with a handful of professional paramedics, Gunnison Valley Health Paramedics are now a fully professional, highly trained team. The award-winning GVH Paramedics are leaders in the EMS industry, often setting the precedent of how other EMS agencies train and operate. The GVH EMS department has faced rapid expansion, particularly over the past several years. The growth is caused by increased population and tourism in the region, as well as expanded service lines including critical care level interfacility transports (IFTs) to larger metropolitan hospitals outside Gunnison County.

The current station was designed for fewer and smaller ambulances, far less equipment, a small fraction of the current staff and there are no sleeping quarters of after-hours personnel, resulting in dangerously delayed response time to 911 calls.

While morale remains relatively high, the burden of increased call volume combined with an inadequate facility to rest, rehab and respond weighs heavily on all crews. Gunnison Valley Health Paramedics are in serious need of an updated ADA and OSHA compliant station.
