

HAVE YOU RECENTLY TESTED POSITIVE FOR COVID-19?

You may be eligible for monoclonal antibody treatment.

FOLLOW THESE STEPS TO DETERMINE IF YOU ARE A CANDIDATE FOR MONOCLONAL ANTIBODY TREATMENT.



Step 1 (VISIT): Visit your primary care provider. If you do not have a primary care provider, contact the Gunnison Valley Health Family Medicine Clinic at 970-642-8413.

Step 2 (SCREEN & ORDER): Your provider will complete the required eligibility screening and supply you with the necessary treatment order for Gunnison Valley Health to be your infusion location.

Step 3 (SCHEDULE): Once your eligibility screening is received by our pharmacy, a representative from Gunnison Valley Health will contact you to schedule a date and time for your treatment.



Please note:

- This is a clinical trial that is operating under an Emergency Use Authorization (EUA). It is not a cure for COVID. It may help decrease the severity of the disease and potentially improve your recovery.
- If your doctor indicates you are a candidate, you will need to bring a prescription from your provider to your appointment.

WHAT ARE MONOCLONAL ANTIBODY COVID-19 TREATMENTS?



Monoclonal antibodies are like your body's own antibodies as they help your immune system quickly destroy the COVID-19 virus before it harms you or causes hospitalization. Fortunately, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration has authorized monoclonal antibody treatment for emergency use for eligible patients.

If you test positive for COVID-19 or have symptoms, talk to a healthcare provider right away. Monoclonal antibody treatment must be given as soon as possible within 10 days of getting a symptom. These treatments are of little to no cost to you and are given through a one-time IV infusion.

WHO CAN RECEIVE MONOCLONAL ANTIBODIES?



You may be eligible for monoclonal antibody treatment if you are 12 years or older and weigh more than 88 pounds, have had mild to moderate symptoms of COVID-19 in the last 10 days, have tested positive for COVID-19, and have one or more of the following high-risk factors:

- Any medical condition or other factor, including race or ethnicity, that puts you at higher risk of progression to severe COVID-19
- Age ≥ 65 years of age
- Obesity or being overweight
- Pregnancy
- Chronic kidney disease
- Diabetes
- Immunosuppressive disease or immunosuppressive treatment
- Cardiovascular disease or hypertension
- Chronic lung diseases
- Sickle cell disease
- Neurodevelopmental disorders
- Having a medical-related technological dependence (for example: tracheostomy, gastrostomy, or positive pressure ventilation not related to COVID-19)

LEARN ABOUT YOUR TREATMENT OPTIONS.



Treatment must be given within 10 days of first COVID-19 symptoms. If you are fully vaccinated against COVID-19 but have tested positive for the virus and are considered high-risk, you may still be eligible for treatment. Talk with a healthcare provider to see if monoclonal antibody treatment is right for you.

You are NOT eligible for treatment if you:

- Are hospitalized due to COVID-19, OR
- Require oxygen therapy due to COVID-19, OR
- Require an increase in baseline oxygen flow rate due to COVID-19 for those on chronic oxygen therapy due to an underlying non-COVID-19 related health issue.
